Dr. Darold H. Jones passed away December 4, 2008 at the age of 77. He served as senior pastor of three congregations in Oregon and California. In 1967, he founded Vacation Samaritans, later known as Samaritans, and led it for 37 years. The ministry took young people and adults into other countries on short-term missions. He brought hundreds to El Sauzal, and inspired many to go into missions. Darold was survived by wife Joyce, three children and seven grandchildren. He was a kind, dear friend and spread joy to those around him.

Abel and Ricardo have graduated high school and are preparing to go into secondary schooling. They are awaiting placement tests that they will take this spring. Your safety: Visiting Mexico with kids

Remember - changes at the border

Traveling into Mexico: There are tighter restrictions about what you bring into Mexico. More cars are being inspected as Mexico works to stop illegal items from entering the country. If you bring in large amounts of items, especially clothing (new and used) or building materials, you may be turned back to the US, or need to declare the items and pay an import tax.

Traveling back into the US: You are required to have a passport or a travel card (passport card, enhanced driver's license or enhanced id) to cross back into the US. You can read more at travel.state.gov/passport.

Taking my kids to Mexico

Eric has been deeply involved with different ministries in the Ensenada area for several years. We asked Eric how he felt about taking his kids to the orphanage.

A Parent's Perspective

Tyler, age 14, as well as my 12-year-old daughter Kylie, have been to the Orphanage several times. Tyler has done philanthropy work with me in Ensenada around twenty times over the last four years. He has connected most with a boy

Jesse (Jesus), and usually hangs out with him when he visits El Sauzal. Tyler

understands the kids don't have the luxuries and opportunities that we have here, but he also thinks the kids have it pretty good at El Sauzal compared to many other kids in Mexico.

What do your kids get out the experience?

Tyler gets several things out of visiting El Sauzal. He goes to both a multiracial church and school. I think it helps Tyler feel comfortable integrating at both. Also, because of his desire to communicate when in Mexico, he is really looking forward to taking Spanish. There are some simple luxuries he has in the US that I believe he understands more clearly — like hot water and clean restrooms. I also think Mexico helps him realize the world is much bigger and more diverse than just what he sees in California. As a parent, I am proud of both of my children for having a heart for the less fortunate, and an appreciation of Mexico.

Is it safe traveling with kids in Mexico?

I do keep an extra eye on my kids when traveling in Mexico, just as I do when I travel with them anywhere in the US. I follow the local Baja news almost daily and consider myself to be very well informed. I also travel to Baja at least once a month. I have never even heard of any charity, church or group being harmed or accosted in any way traveling to the Ensenada area, nor have I seen or had any problems in the brief drive through Tijuana headed in or out. I have yet to have even any petty crimes or incidents occur in Mexico, but have experienced plenty here in the US.

I'm not suggesting Mexico is safer, but considering the millions of residences, tens of thousands of daily border crossers, and the circumstance in which I travel to Mexico, I believe it to be statistically more probable for us to win the lottery or experience a car accident here in the US. Given these points, I am rather comfortable traveling with my kids to private destinations like the El Sauzal Orphanage.
