Mama Magdalena

Almost four decades ago when Ramon and Magdalena Espinoza began caring full-time for children, it was out of their home. Since then they have raised and cared for hundreds of children. Although Magdalena is retired from running El Sauzal, the children still call her Mama Magdalena, and she lives next door. Her grown orphanage kids come and visit all the time.

Magdalena's femoral artery has blockage in a few locations. Magdalena is doing alright but suffers with quite a bit of pain, and has little or no feeling in her leg and foot. She has had diabetes for most of her life. She is very pale and weak, mostly bed-ridden, and walking slowly

Nanny Maria

Maria has worked at the orphanage for about ten years. When she first arrived, she had nothing with her but her three children – no home, no money and no job. She became a nanny, and later a cook. Since then God has restored her to her husband. Her children are growing and she has her own home in the community. Maria is a hard-working, loving nanny who puts her whole heart into her work.

Maria has recently been diagnosed with breast cancer. Her doctors believe it is operable and her prognosis is good. We don't know her treatment yet, but it will be hard on her. Please join us in praying for healing for Maria.
