Her husband loved helping orphans

My husband Michael visited El Sauzal in 2005. He was extremely passionate about helping widows and orphans—“Pure and undefiled religion before God the Father is this: to visit orphans and widows in their trouble, and to keep oneself unspotted from the world.” *James 1:27*

A couple months after he first visited we relocated from San Diego, California to a small town in Spirit Lake, Idaho. This made another trip to El Sauzal financially impossible for my husband and our growing family. But the orphanage and the people he met there always remained close to his heart. He prayed for the children and staff frequently and sent money whenever we could.

Our photography business began to grow here in Idaho and we decided that we would donate ten percent from each job to the orphanage. 2010 was projected to be our most profitable year. However, on June 24, 2010 my husband died in a canoe accident.

Helping children at risk

Sometimes the Ensenada police find children that are at risk from abuse, neglect, abandonment, etc. When the police encounter a child in danger, day or night, they contact a DIF representative (Mexican social services), and ask where to take the child.

Good relationship with the police

We have a good relationship with the Ensenada police. Recently a policeman brought two brothers, Yehirem Emanuel and Kevin Jesus, ages 1 and 5, to orphanage director Josue. The policeman said to Josue, "You are always willing to rescue children in distress."

The children belong to our orphanage until DIF takes control and determines what will be best for them. Often they will stay and live at El Sauzal.

Damian has been selected by the 1995-1996 category Baja California Selection Soccer Sports Association. He is on a state sponsored soccer team. He also in on a local team called "Tigres" to improve his conditioning so he will be ready when the state team competes with teams from other states. This gives him exposure for scouts from professional soccer teams. His dream is to be selected by a professional team.

If he can continue to play for a state team it will open doors for scholarships for his higher education.

It costs about \$28 dollars per week for food and transportation from the orphanage to Ensenada for soccer practice, five days a week. Additionally he needs soccer shoes, shin guards, and an equipment bag. The orphanage does not have the funds to continue paying the transportation and food cost. Neither do they have extra money for Damian's equipment.
