

## Replacing painful memories with happy ones

### A family and a future for wounded children

We have had nine new children brought to us recently. Six of these little ones are in the nursery. It is bustling with activity. We are blessed that they are here, but each of their stories are heart-wrenching. Most of these children are deeply wounded—neglected, abandoned and abused. To protect the children, we are going to limit the details of their stories. (None of the new niños are pictured here.)

### Tales of unspeakable pain

- Three of our newest children are siblings up in the nursery. Their father tried to asphyxiate the littlest, an infant, with a pillow. The mother went for help to the police; they found evidence of neglect and drug abuse by both parents.
- One child was abandoned by his mother, a drug addict. The mother herself had grown up as a ward of the state, and has had several children taken away. The mom left her new one with a neighbor and never returned. The little one came to us sick, having difficulty breathing.
- Another of the children, a newborn, was brought to the orphanage because the baby's mother gave birth to the newborn while she was in jail. Since no family members showed up to claim the child, the infant was brought to us.
- Another two young siblings were taken away from their mother by the police for neglect. She also is a drug addict. They have a grandmother who lives in another state who would like to come and get them, when her finances allow it.
- For two elementary siblings, their parents had a

violent split. Their father struck the mother in the head with a hammer, locked her in their home, and left her for dead. The neighbors heard it and called the police. When the police arrived, they found the mom unconscious. She was hospitalized in critical condition, and hasn't recovered yet.

### Giving hope in dark circumstances

Our deepest desire is to lead each child to Christ. Psalm 30:5 says "Crying may last for a night, but joy comes in the morning." Every child that comes to us has lost family and been hurt deeply. We cry with them, pray with them and love them. We strive to give them a normal life, with joyful childhood memories, such as participating in parades like this.

This is what we do; this is the ministry God has given us. Thank you for joining us as we continue **God's work of helping wounded children.** It's our mission of eternal importance.
