

Rooted in Hope, Ready for 2025 58 Years of Caring for His Children

Debt Drops Dramatically



Several years of a weak U.S. dollar inflated our debt, so the end of 2024 brought real relief. As the peso weakened, the value of our debt dropped—and with the added blessing of a longstanding water debt being forgiven, our total debt fell to its lowest level since before the pandemic.

When It Was Tight, God Was Always Faithful

At El Sauzal Home for Children, we know that God ordained and established this home—and He continues to provide, even when the road is steep. Yet, as many of you know, the challenges we face often come from circumstances outside our control.

Over the past year, the exchange rate between the U.S. dollar and the Mexican peso shifted, impacting our purchasing power. The peso remained strong, meaning each dollar covered less than before.

For example, if a \$1,000 donation in previous years once converted to 20,000 pesos, in 2024, that same amount only yielded about 17,000 pesos. With rising costs for food, school supplies, and daily necessities, this put an even

greater strain on our already stretched budget. On top of that, the Mexican government has mandated a 20% salary increase for staff every year for the past several years. While we are grateful to care for those who care for our children—many of whom are like family to us—these ongoing increases have added a significant financial burden to our Home.

Just in Time, God Opened a Door

As we stepped into 2025, we witnessed a shift we believe was from God. The exchange rate rose significantly, reaching 19.8752 so far this year—about 13% higher than before. This increase gives us far more purchasing power, making every dollar go further.

This shift is especially important because the majority of El Sauzal Home for Children's funding comes from the United States. When the U.S. dollar is strong against the peso, donations from our amigos provide even more financial support for the Home. This means we can stretch every gift further, covering not just the daily essentials but also long-term needs like repairs and education.

In His perfect timing, God provided exactly what we needed. We witnessed a wonderful outpouring of generosity from our amigos at Christmastime, the end of 2024. Then, as the new year began, the exchange rate shifted in our favor, multiplying the impact of those gifts. Because of this unexpected blessing, we were able to take an encouraging step—paying off a portion of our longstanding debt and easing financial burdens that had weighed on our Home.

Our Director, Erika, who works every day to make sure our Home runs and our kids are cared for, has given so much of herself for the sake of the children. Like her father, Josué, and her grandparents Papa Ramón and Mama Magdalena, Erika has poured out her time, her love, her strength, and even her health to ensure that El Sauzal remains a place of love and safety for children

in need. This heritage of faith has been passed from generation to generation, grounded in service, compassion, and trust in the Lord.

At the end of 2024, Erika had even maxed out four personal credit cards to ensure every child's needs were met. Thanks to your prayers, your generosity, and this improved exchange rate, we could ease some of that heavy burden—also making headway on overdue taxes and avoiding extra penalties that would have further strained our finances.

Your Faithfulness Fueled This Miracle

We want to extend our deepest thanks to you—our kind and generous amigos, supporters, and prayer warriors. Your thoughtful support and faithful giving have carried us through these difficult times. Because of you, our children enjoy a safe home, nourishing meals, and the hope of a brighter future—one rooted in the love of Jesus. We not only care for their daily

Growing Healthy Futures

Our amigo Christine from Washington asked recently: Why do you have fewer children than you had in the past?

With updated regulations in Mexico, it costs more to care for children than it used to. Although we currently have fewer children than in previous years, their needs are significantly deeper. Our kids require more specialized support—extensive dental treatments, increased psychological and psychiatric care, and enrollment in multiple schools to meet their safety and behavioral needs. While regular medical visits are generally not needed, we frequently experience medical emergencies during the winter months, requiring weekly or biweekly doctor visits from August through March due to flus and colds.

With your help, we remain dedicated to nurturing hope by focusing on the emotional, educational, physical, and spiritual wellbeing of each child entrusted to us. We trust that God's plan includes welcoming more children into our care in the future as He continues to guide and grow our Home with hope and purpose.
